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1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 About the World Stomatological Organization (WSO)

The **World Stomatological Organization (WSO)** is an international, non-governmental, and non-profit professional body registered in Singapore (UEN: 202517520W), with additional legal standing in Malaysia as *World Stomatological Academy (Company No. 1616437-H)*.

WSO was founded with the resolute mission to **safeguard the oral health of all humanity** and to **elevate the quality of life** through cross-sectoral collaboration, academic advancement, and innovation in dental and oral healthcare. It aspires to be the *oral healthcare branch of the World Health Organization (WHO)*, contributing to global health governance through evidence-based policymaking, academic leadership, and accessible innovation.

At its core, WSO believes that oral health is a fundamental human right and a critical determinant of general health, productivity, and human dignity. In response to increasing global disparities in oral healthcare access and outcomes, WSO positions itself as a **unifying force**, integrating the voices of academia, clinical practitioners, educators, students, policymakers, industry leaders, and communities across borders.

WSO's guiding philosophy is rooted in the **WSO Manifesto**, which outlines a global oral health agenda centered around:

- **Collaborative Equality:** Embracing inclusive, democratic governance in place of hierarchy or exclusivity.
- **Ecosystem Synergy:** Prioritizing cooperative advancement and mutual prosperity over zero-sum competition.
- **Science-Driven Action:** Grounding all initiatives in rigorous research, innovation, and validated best practices.
- **Social Responsibility:** Balancing technological and economic progress with long-term sustainability, public health awareness, and equitable value distribution.

Through its dynamic **Membership Framework**, WSO recognizes contributions to the field of oral health via tiered fellowships such as *Member*, *Prodigy Fellow*, *Fellow*, *High Achiever Fellow*, *Master Fellow*, and *Lifetime Achievement Fellow*. This meritocratic system encourages continual contribution, public service, global collaboration, and technological leadership in oral health.

WSO is currently in the process of establishing collaborative platforms with industry through its **Corporate Section**, as well as with academia through its **Educational and Scientific Chapters**. These efforts are designed to mobilize global capacity, encourage public–private partnerships, and foster international knowledge exchange.

Looking forward, WSO is engaging key international stakeholders to formalize its position as the **designated oral health partner of WHO**, a neutral, science-driven body capable of responding to global oral health crises, coordinating international policy frameworks, and championing the integration of oral health into universal healthcare agendas.

The organization’s long-term vision includes:

- Hosting **global academic summits** and **conferment ceremonies** across major regions,
- Launching **pan-regional oral health programs** to support underserved populations,
- Developing **WSO Policy** to be submitted to WHO for strategic alignment,
- Building a **membership base of one million** professionals and institutions by 2030.

WSO is not an idealistic venture, but a coalition of action-oriented professionals committed to writing the next chapter of global oral health for humanity—rooted in science, guided by ethics, and driven by partnership.

1.2 Structural Framework – Six Pillars of WSO

The Six Pillars of WSO

The World Stomatological Organization (WSO) is founded upon the belief that the strength of global dentistry lies not in one profession alone, but in the unity and interdependence of all who contribute to oral health. This philosophy is embodied in our Six Pillars of the Dental Profession, a framework that celebrates the diversity of expertise, roles, and service that together form the foundation of the global stomatological community.

PILLAR I : Leaders, Coaches, Trainers, and Speakers

At the heart of every thriving profession are those who inspire, guide, and nurture others. This pillar honours **educators, mentors, and speakers** who dedicate themselves to shaping the next generation of dental professionals. Through teaching, coaching, and continuous learning, they impart not only knowledge but also values, fostering critical thinking, professional ethics, and innovation. These individuals serve as the conscience and compass of the profession, ensuring that wisdom and excellence are passed forward across generations.

PILLAR II : Dentists

The second pillar represents the **clinicians**, the cornerstone of oral healthcare. Dentists embody both the art and science of healing, combining technical precision with compassion in service to patients. Beyond treating disease, they play a crucial role in prevention, education, and community health advocacy. Their continuous pursuit of knowledge and improvement advances dental science, making this pillar the foundation upon which the practice of stomatology stands.

PILLAR III : Paradental Auxiliaries

No dental practice can thrive without the essential support of skilled paradental professionals, **dental hygienists, therapists, nurses, and assistants**. They are the hands and hearts that sustain clinical care. Through their technical expertise and patient communication, they ensure quality, safety, and comfort in every aspect of care delivery. This pillar reflects the teamwork and collaboration that transform dental care into a seamless, compassionate experience.

PILLAR IV : Dental Entrepreneurs and Manufacturers

Innovation propels the profession forward, and this pillar honours the visionaries who transform ideas into impact. **Entrepreneurs, manufacturers, and industry leaders** bridge science and business, bringing new technologies, materials, and digital solutions to the dental world. Their courage to invest, innovate, and adapt keeps dentistry aligned with global progress. Through their efforts, the industry remains vibrant, competitive, and responsive to the evolving needs of practitioners and patients alike.

PILLAR V : Dental Technicians

Dental **technicians** are the artisans of the oral health profession, translating clinical precision into tangible outcomes. With craftsmanship, creativity, and scientific understanding, they bring smiles to life through restorations, prosthetics, and aesthetic design. Their work combines artistry with advanced technology, ensuring that each patient's restoration reflects both functionality and beauty. This pillar reminds us that dentistry is not only a science but also a form of human expression.

PILLAR VI : Dental Hospital and Clinic Managers

Behind every successful dental institution stands a team of capable **administrators and managers** who ensure excellence in operations, safety, and patient experience. These leaders manage systems, people, and resources with integrity and efficiency, turning vision into sustainable outcomes. By overseeing the logistical and ethical dimensions of healthcare delivery, they enable clinicians to focus on their calling, to heal and to serve. This pillar symbolizes the structure, governance, and accountability that sustain the profession at its highest standards.

Together, these six pillars form the living structure of the World Stomatological Organization, where every member, regardless of role, contributes to the shared mission of “*One World, One Health, One Smile.*”

1.3 Core Responsibilities, Obligations and Code of Conduct

Chapter I: Core Responsibilities of a Fellow

1. Academic Leadership

- Uphold the spirit of scientific inquiry and drive cutting-edge research and technological innovation in dentistry to elevate academic standards within the profession.
- Actively participate in WSO-organized academic activities (e.g., forums, symposiums), sharing professional insights and practical experience.

2. Industry Advancement

- Facilitate the integration of regional private dental sector with international standards in technology, management, and service delivery.
- Contribute strategic advice to WSO's development, participate in the formulation of industry guidelines or standards, and support the standardized growth of dental medicine.

3. Ethics and Public Welfare

- Abide by medical ethics, uphold healthcare equity, and oppose academic misconduct and unethical commercial competition.
- Support oral health public welfare initiatives, including outreach programs for underserved communities or participation in international aid efforts.

Chapter II: Obligations of a Fellow

1. International Exchange and Collaboration

- Proactively build bridges for foreign cooperation in dentistry, introducing advanced technologies and management practices and promoting their localized application.
- Assist in establishing partnerships with international dental organizations to enhance the global presence of WSO.

2. Talent Development

- Foster the next generation of dental professionals through mentorship, education, training, or academic guidance.
- Submit regular reports on industry trends or policy recommendations to annual WSO Global Meeting, contributing direction to talent cultivation efforts.

3. Brand Stewardship

- Protect the reputation of WSO and refrain from any activities under any title of *Fellow* that may damage the organization's image or deviate from its mission.
- It is strictly prohibited to misuse the *Fellow* title for excessive commercial promotion or personal gain.
- Communications during academic exchanges, media coverage, or public relations should remain objective and avoid exaggerated or misleading claims.
- Actively promote the ideals of WSO and enhance the organization's credibility within the industry and among the public.

Chapter III: Code of Conduct

1. Term and Evaluation

- The term of a Fellow is five (5) years. Renewal requires evaluation by the WSO Credential Committee based on contributions, industry influence, and fulfilment of responsibilities.

2. Self-Discipline

- Comply with the laws and regulations of the respective country and adhere to WSO's constitution. Academic fraud, commercial bribery, or similar misconduct is strictly prohibited.
- When expressing opinions publicly, Fellows must distinguish between personal views and WSO's official position.

3. Exit Mechanism

- Any Fellow found in violation of this Code or who has long neglected their responsibilities may have their Fellowship revoked by vote of the WSO Council.
- Voluntary resignation requires a written notice at least three months in advance and the return of the Fellow certificate and associated privileges.

Chapter IV: Supplementary Provisions

1. The interpretation of this Code rests with the WSO Council. Revisions require approval by two-thirds of the Fellows at the General Assembly.
2. Fellows must sign a Declaration of Commitment, indicating full agreement to and compliance with all terms of this Code.

2.0 MEMBERSHIP & FELLOWSHIP

2.1 Fellowship Ascension Pathway: A Model of Inclusive Global Recognition

To ensure long-term engagement, meaningful recognition, and sustainable growth, WSO has developed a **Fellowship Ascension Pathway**; a multi-tiered system that allows members from all levels of experience and backgrounds to grow with the organization and be recognized accordingly.

This pathway democratizes professional honors, ensuring that contributions from **the WSO's Six Pillars** are acknowledged within a global structure.




Diagram 2.1.1 Fellowship Ascension Pathway

The pathway is outlined as follows:

1. **Ordinary Member**

Individuals from any which of the Six Pillars who support WSO's mission and join the global community.

2. **Prodigy (PWSO)**

Young professionals (typically under 35) demonstrating exceptional promise and innovation in their respective fields.

3. **Fellow (FWSO)**

Mid- to senior-level professionals within any which of the Six Pillars and recognized for their unwavering commitment to professional excellence, integrity, and service.

4. **Distinguished Fellow (DFWSO)**

Fellows who have demonstrated outstanding contributions to the dental profession through leadership, innovation, education, or community engagement.

5. **High Achiever Fellow (HAFWSO)**

Fellows who have made significant regional or national impact in advancing oral health, policy, public awareness, or inter-professional integration.

6. **President's Citation Fellow (PCFWSO)**

Fellows who have rendered exceptional service to the organization or the profession at large. It recognizes devotion, loyalty, and outstanding contributions that embody the WSO's mission.

7. **Master Fellow (MFWSO)**

Visionaries and pioneers Fellows who have led transformational changes within the global dental community or created lasting institutional or systemic change.

8. **Emeritus Fellow (EFWSO)**

Honorary recognition granted to retired or semi-retired Fellows who have completed an illustrious career of service to WSO and the global oral health community.

9. **Lifetime Achievement Fellow (LAFWSO)**

Reserved for the most distinguished figures whose legacies have transcended borders and advanced the global oral health agenda significantly.

2.2 Eligibility Criteria

To maintain a fair, transparent, and merit-based structure of professional advancement, eligibility for each level within the WSO Fellowship Ascension Pathway shall be governed by the following general and specific criteria. All admissions, elevations, and recognitions are subject to the approval of the WSO Council and adherence to the WSO Code of Ethics and Professional Conduct.

1. Ordinary Member

- a) Must be at least 18 years old of age.
- b) Must be within any which of WSO's Six Pillars, or individual with an interest in the field of stomatology or oral health.
- c) Must endorse the Constitution, vision, and mission of the World Stomatological Organization.
- d) Must commit to abide by the ethical, academic, and professional standards as prescribed by WSO.
- e) No prior affiliation or recommendation is required; membership is open to all individuals who share the objectives of the Organization.

2. Prodigy (PWSO)

- a) Must be at least 18 years old of age.
- b) Must be an undergraduate, postgraduate, or early-career actively pursuing education, research, or clinical training in dentistry or any which of WSO's Six Pillars.
- c) Must demonstrate strong interest in international collaboration, leadership development, and innovation in oral healthcare.
- d) Must agree to participate in mentorship, academic exchange, or developmental programmes organized under the WSO Prodigy Development Framework.

3. Fellow (FWSO)

- a) Must be at least 25 years old of age.
- b) Must demonstrate consistent commitment to professional excellence, ethical integrity, and public service within the dental or medical community.
- c) Must provide verifiable evidence of contribution in at least one of WSO's Six Pillars.
- d) Must have participated in WSO, regional, or international academic activities demonstrating alignment with the Organization's mission and values.

4. Distinguished Fellow (DFWSO)

- a) Must be at least 30 years old of age.
- b) Must be an existing Fellow in good standing with an established record of professional excellence and contribution to the advancement of the dental profession.
- c) Must have made outstanding contributions in one or more of the following: academic leadership, institutional governance, clinical innovation, professional training, or community service.
- d) Must have produced tangible outcomes (e.g., policy influence, publications, training programmes, or social initiatives) that have positively impacted oral healthcare at regional or international levels.
- e) Nomination must be supported by at least two (2) Distinguished Fellows in good standing, or by a WSO Council.

5. High Achiever Fellow (HAFWSO)

- a) Must be at least 40 years old of age.
- b) Must be an existing Fellow or Distinguished Fellow in good standing who has attained regional or global recognition through scientific research, technological advancement, or humanitarian work in oral health.
- c) Must demonstrate measurable impact in advancing dental science, technology, or healthcare access, particularly in underrepresented or developing regions.
- d) Must have delivered keynote lectures, published in peer-reviewed journals, or led significant academic, scientific, or social projects contributing to the WSO vision.
- e) Nomination must be supported by at least two (2) High Achiever Fellows in good standing, or by a WSO Council.

6. President Citation Fellow (PCFWSO)

- a) This recognition shall be conferred solely at the discretion of the President of the World Stomatological Organization at the time of inauguration.
- b) Eligible individuals must have rendered exceptional service or contributions to WSO or to the profession of dentistry that reflect extraordinary commitment, leadership, or innovation.
- c) May be awarded to individuals within or outside WSO who have supported its mission in a manner of significant and lasting influence.
- d) Requires the concurrence of the WSO Executive Council and inclusion in the official register of Presidential Citations.

7. Master Fellow (MFSWO)

- a) Must be at least 45 years old of age.
- b) Must be a senior Fellow, Distinguished Fellow, or High Achiever Fellow in good standing who has demonstrated intellectual leadership, mentorship, and excellence in professional governance.
- c) Must have contributed significantly to academic development, institutional reform, or the establishment of best practices within the dental community.
- d) Must have a proven record of mentoring, teaching, or training future leaders within the profession.
- e) Nomination must be endorsed by the WSO President or at least two (2) members of the Global Council, and validated through a peer review process.

8. Emeritus Fellow (EFSWO)

- a) Must be at least 50 years old of age.
- b) Must be a Fellow, Distinguished Fellow, or Master Fellow who has entered retirement or partial retirement from active professional or academic duties.
- c) Must have demonstrated lifelong dedication to the Organization's mission and have made substantial, long-term contributions to the development of global oral health.
- d) May be recommended by the Global Council, or by two (2) peers of equivalent standing.
- e) Approval is contingent upon verification of continued ethical standing and reputation within the professional community.

9. Lifetime Achievement Fellow (LAFWSO)

- a) Reserved for individuals whose lifetime of service, scholarship, and leadership has profoundly transformed the global landscape of dentistry and stomatology.
- b) Must have demonstrated contributions that extend beyond national boundaries and have resulted in measurable global impact on healthcare, education, or humanitarian development.
- c) May include pioneers, inventors, institutional founders, or world leaders in oral health recognized by multiple international bodies.
- d) Selection shall be conducted by the WSO Executive Council upon nomination by the President and ratified by the Global Council.
- e) This title is conferred as the highest form of distinction and cannot be applied for; it is awarded by invitation only.

2.3 Application Process for Membership

The World Stomatological Organization (WSO) is built on the principles of inclusivity, accessibility, and global solidarity. In line with this philosophy, **joining WSO as a member is entirely free of charge.**

All individuals involved in oral healthcare, regardless of discipline, geography, or seniority, are welcome to register as members and participate in WSO's global programs, initiatives, and communities.

Free membership ensures that WSO remains an open and democratic platform, uniting professionals across sectors in pursuit of improved oral health outcomes worldwide.

2.3.1 Submission Guidelines

Applicants are required to complete the official **WSO Member Information Form**, which is appended by the end of this handbook.

All submissions shall be sent electronically to the following official WSO email at **wsiorginfo@gmail.com**.

2.3.2 Credential Review & Notification

Upon receipt, the WSO Secretariat's Office shall undertake a thorough check of each application. The standard review period is **three (3) to seven (7) working days**, following which the applicant shall receive formal notification of the receipts.

2.4 Application Process for Fellowship

The World Stomatological Organization (WSO) invites all individuals with to submit applications for conferment as **Prodigy Fellow** or **WSO Fellow**, in recognition of their professional merit, contributions, and commitment to advancing the field of oral healthcare globally.

This process is governed by the WSO Credentialing Committee to ensure the integrity, transparency, and merit-based standards of our international fellowship.

2.4.1 Submission Guidelines

Applicants are required to complete the official **WSO Fellowship Application Form**, which is appended at the end of this handbook. All applications must include the following supporting documentation:

- A comprehensive and updated Curriculum Vitae (CV)
- All related certificates of mentioned credentials.

All submissions shall be sent electronically to the following official WSO email at **wsiorginfo@gmail.com**.

2.4.2 Credential Review & Notification

Upon receipt, the WSO Credentialing Committee shall undertake a comprehensive evaluation of each application. The standard review period is **seven (7) to fourteen (14) working days**, following which the applicant shall receive formal notification of the outcome.

Successful Applicants:

- Shall receive an **Official Letter of Approval and Congratulations** issued by the WSO Headquarters.
- Will be issued an **invoice for the appropriate conferment fee:**
- Payment instructions and details regarding the next available conferment ceremony (physical or virtual) will be included.

Unsuccessful Applicants:

- Shall receive a formal **Letter of Rejection**, including specific reasons for the Committee's decision.
- The applicant shall be eligible to **submit a revised application within sixty (60) calendar days**, unless otherwise stated in the rejection notice.
- Where appropriate, applicants may seek further clarification or advisory from the WSO Secretariat before reapplication.

2.5 WSO Fellowship Conferment Fees

A **one-time conferment fee** is applicable upon nomination or selection to receive a formal WSO fellowship title.

2.5.1. WSO Fellow Conferment Fee – USD 400

The **WSO Fellow** designation is awarded to mid- and senior-level professionals who have made notable contributions to clinical practice, education, research, or healthcare leadership.

The **USD 400 conferment fee** covers:

- **Official WSO Fellowship Certificate**
- **WSO Sash and Fellow (FWSO) Lapel Pin**
- Listing in the **WSO Global Fellowship Registry**
- Eligibility for WSO speaking appointments, leadership roles, and governance
- Priority invitations to participate in WSO's global symposia, forums, and advisory panels

2.5.2 Prodigy Fellow Conferment Fee – USD 200

The **WSO Prodigy Fellow** title recognizes **outstanding young professionals (typically under the age of 35)** who have demonstrated early leadership, academic promise, or clinical innovation.

The **USD 200 conferment fee** covers:

- **Official WSO Prodigy Fellowship Certificate**
- **WSO Sash and Prodigy Fellow (PWSO) Lapel Pin**
- Invitations to youth panels and early career development and mentorship programs.
- Fast-track eligibility toward full Fellowship status as prodigy career advances.

- **High Achiever Fellow, Master Fellow, and Lifetime Achievement Fellow** are **strictly awarded by invitation** of the **WSO Global Council & Credential Committee** based on distinguished merit and are **not open for application without nomination**.
- Fellowship fees shall only be made once the **application has been approved**.
- Fees are **non-refundable** upon initiation of the induction process.
- All Fellowship titles are to be conferred through official **WSO International Conferment Ceremonies**, either in-person or virtually (**with a one-year in-person induction requirement post virtual conferment**).
